

Dear Tenants,

Notice to Tenants – Bin Management.

The management of bins by some JAH Tenants has been cause for concern in recent months. Management of litter is extremely important at an airport, where litter can impact aircraft operations and safety.

- Bins should be placed on the verge for Monday collection no earlier than the preceding Sunday afternoon.
- Bins should never be over-filled and lids should always be fully closed. This prevents litter from being blown out of the bins and stops bird and vermin access. This will also avoid the situation of litter being blown from over-filled bins during the bin lift.
- Ensure bin placement on road verges does not damage or affect the operations of sprinklers.
- Remove bins from the road verge promptly after emptying.
- Be mindful of windy and stormy conditions.

Tenants who fail to adequately manage their bins and litter may be re-charged for clean-up costs.

What goes in the yellow bin?

- Aerosol cans
- All glass
- Aluminium cans
- Aluminium foil
- Beer cartons
- Bottle tops / lids (take off lids)
- Cutlery (plastic, other)
- Drink cans
- Foam boxes
- Foam meat trays
- Foil
- Food cans (rinsed)
- Carbon paper
- Cardboard (boxes & other types)
- Cellophane
- Ceramic (broken plates, cups, pots)
- Fruit juice cartons
- Glad wrap
- Greaseproof paper
- Polystyrene
- Pyrex (ovenware)
- Steel cans (rinsed)
- Paper (all)
- Plastic containers
- Plastic bags empty
- Tops (jars/bottles)
- Waxed cardboard & paper



What goes in the green bin?

- Band-Aids
- Baskets
- Cotton wool
- Cotton wool buds
- Disposable nappies
- Fly tape
- Food, fruit & vegetable scraps
- Cassette tapes (audio & video)
- Cooking fat
- Cork
- Garden waste (small)
- Kitty litter
- Manure/animal droppings
- Pottery
- Sanitary pads, tampons
- Soap
- Sweet wrappers
- Terracotta tiles/pots
- Tissues
- Pens/biros/textas/pencils
- Picture frames (broken)
- Placemats
- Toothbrushes
- Toothpaste tubes
- Toys (broken)
- Vacuum cleaner dust
- Vinyl school bags (broken)
- Other vinyl (kitchen tiles etc)
- Weeds
- Wood (garden pruning)



NEITHER BIN

Controlled/Hazardous Waste. No petrol, gas cylinders, paints, oil and oily wastes, chemicals, poisons, cleaners, acids, bleaches and ammonia, medicines and flammable liquids. Tenants should be familiar with the Environmental Protection (**Controlled Waste**) Regulations 2004 and dispose of their controlled/hazardous wastes accordingly via licensed waste contractors.

Batteries (domestic), mobile phones, printer cartridges, can all be dropped off at recycling points at libraries & shopping centres. JAH currently offer a complementary quarterly battery collection service for Jandakot Airport tenants. This is currently for 'wet' lead acid batteries only but will be expanded in the future to include other battery types.

Clothes can be taken to charity shops. Otherwise use the green top bin.

Light bulbs are preferably taken in a separate bag to Henderson Waste Recovery Centre (no cost); however where this is unrealistic they should be put in the Yellow Top Bin.
